AND OUR COMMUNITY AWARD WINNER 2019 IS....

The Community Award Selection Committee is tasked each year with choosing a worthy recipient of St. Patrick's Society's annual Community Award, an award that has been given to a member of the community since 1993. The two goals the committee governs itself by are the following:

- 1. To honour a person within the Irish community who has served in low-profile positions yet who has worked wholeheartedly for the good of the whole community.
- 2. To honour a Montrealer of Irish descent who has assumed a broader mandate to serve beyond the borders of our local Irish societies. His/her achievements bring honour to us all and it is fitting that we acknowledge such commitment.

St. Patrick's Society's Community Award Selection Committee met on February 18th to consider ten nominations either received this year or held over from previous years. The committee, consisting of Christopher Deehy, Louise Guimond, Martina McLean, David Dubeau, Ken Quinn (Chairman), and Christie Brown (ex-officio), definitely had a difficult task ahead of it. Each nominee is worthy, however, only one may be selected. With so many strong candidates, you can be assured those who were not selected will be considered in 2020.

We are pleased to advise you that **Ms.** Lori **Morrison** has been selected as the recipient of the 2019 Community Award. Ms. Morrison has always viewed giving back to her community and empowering/elevating those who need an extra boost as a core element of her being. Having come from a challenged background and been encouraged to rise above her circumstances by some caring volunteers who recognized her potential, she vowed to pay it forward when she had the means and opportunity.

An early foray into community involvement occurred in 1995 when she organized "No Use For Your Abuse", a benefit concert that took place at the Purple Haze bar, in 1995, showcasing local talent and raising funds for local women's shelters. Ms. Morrison has volunteered at the Montreal Children's Hospital Auxiliary gift wrapping campaigns for years as well as financially supporting Share the Warmth's school supplies program, quietly contributing to her community.

In 2010, Ms. Morrison created and funded the IMBY (In My Backyard) Award for community leadership at Howard S. Billings High School in Chateauguay. Its purpose is to recognize and encourage students who have shown community leadership in many areas, including environmental cleanup, the promotion of social justice, and the fight against poverty. The award, originally 500\$, was increased to 1,000\$, in 2017. Additionally, Ms. Morrison is a program mentor with SheEO, a Canadian community of women changing the face of business.

Since 2017, she has sponsored the Sharron Prior Scholarship, offered through the Pointe-Saint-Charles Hall of Recognition. Having grown up in the Point, Ms. Morrison understands the importance of giving back to the community by assisting dedicated young people in pursuing their education.

In addition to all of this, she is a GOAL initiative major contributor (founded by Paul Desbaillets of Burgundy Lion, in Montreal), supporting Right To Play.

For all of the reasons above, often going about her activities without notice, Lori Morrison has assumed a broader mandate to serve beyond the borders of our local Irish societies. Her achievements bring honour to us all.

Her commitment to her community will be recognized at the Annual Luncheon on March 15th at the Centre Sheraton. Get your tickets soon. We hear they are selling at a good pace.

Please note that unless you have your own hat, gloves and sashes, you are required to return the hat, gloves and sashes that are temporarily provided to you for use at the parade only.

marching formation

We will march in the following order:

- Society Banner
- Montreal Pipes and Drums,
- 5 flag bearers (Email Katie if you are interested in carrying one of the 5 flags),
- · Society president with a director on either side, and
- Everyone else will walk FOUR across in proper alignment with the person ahead of you.



CINÉ GAEL 27TH SEASON OFF TO A BLAST

Ciné Gael Montréal blasted off for an incredible 27th season on Friday, January 11. What began as an idea tossed around at a cultural committee meeting of the St. Patrick's Society in 1992, has become the longest-running film festival screening Irish films outside of Ireland. Along the way, Montreal audiences have been the fortunate recipients of an astonishing breadth of Irish cinema.



This year's festival launched with the explosive, critically-acclaimed drama, Black '47, set in the midst of the infamous Great Irish Famine. In the film, Feeney, played by James Frecheville, is an Irish Ranger who abandons the British army to return home and uncover the truth about how his family has been terrorized

and left to die in misery. Other members of the stellar cast include Hugo Weaving, Stephen Rea, and Moe Dunford.

Paul Whitington reviewing the film in the Irish Independent wrote, "...Black 47 succeeds magnificently in evoking the misery of the Famine while simultaneously treating us to a rattling adventure yarn."

The festival continued two weeks later, on January 25, with No Stone Unturned by renowned director, Alex Gibney. This gripping documentary film searches for answers to the 1994 massacre of six Irishmen at a pub in Loughinisland. The notorious crime remains unsolved to this day despite the long investigation that led to justifiable criticisms of the process. Wendy Ide wrote in the Guardian, "Scrupulously even-handed, the film explores collusion between police and paramilitaries and the decidedly unstable foundations underpinning the Northern Ireland peace process."


The moniker, "the fighting Irish", is a fitting theme to the month of February, as the third and fourth



films relate to boxing. Float Like A Butterfly, presented on February 8, introduced us to Frances, a fifteen-year-old girl fighting to have the right to fight back in a boxing ring and, in the process, raise the profile of "the Travelers" growing up in rural Irish camps.

The Irish actress.

Hazel Doupe, playing the young boxer, was mesmerizing in a very physically demanding role but just as Frances, she played it with dogged determination. The film was awarded the Prize of the International Federation of Film Critics at the Toronto International Film Festival in 2018. As a bonus treat for film-goers, Hazel recorded a short introduction especially for Ciné Gael, which was played before the film.



The pugilistic theme passes from boxing fiction to boxing legend in the award-winning documentary, Rocky Ros Muc, to be shown, on Thursday evening, February 28.

This film explores the rise of Ros Muc-born, Sean Mannion, as he emigrates to America and becomes a protegé of the Irish mob in Boston while training for a shot at the world light middleweight title. Kevin Cullen of the Boston Globe, wrote, "Mannion's story is not so much about talent squandered, about how surrounding himself with better people would have given him a better chance to be an enduring world champion. It's about a man who stayed true

to his roots, his language, his culture, his family, and ultimately, his soul." For this presentation, we expect to have a Q&A period after the movie with Rónán Mac Con lomaire, the author of the book, "The Man Who Was Never Knocked Down: The Life Of Boxer Seán Mannion", upon which the film is based.

A little more than a week later on March 8, the vital but jolting documentary film, Shelter Me, will be screened. The film covers the grassroots movement spotlighting



homelessness, especially visible in Dublin, that culminated t h e occupation of Apollo House, vacant, governmentowned building in the heart of the city. Artists, community activists, a n d a n emboldened public stepped forward to

volunteer their time and join the effort to convert the abandoned office building into a homeless shelter in the days leading up to Christmas, 2016. An added bonus that evening will be the Skype conversation, after the film, with the actor and writer, Terry McMahon, who was one of the participants in the occupation of Apollo House. Before the film, Ciné Gael has been graced with a bonus: the latest short film by the director, Zahara Moufid.

Music will be in the air on March 22 as Lomax in Éirinn is presented. This film examines how the American ethnomusicologist, Alan Lomax, started an effort to preserve roots-type music around the world, beginning in Ireland and in the process, raised the profile of traditional Irish music, sowing the seeds of its revival in the 1970's.

Fans of the short film genre will be elated to learn that the date of April 5 is reserved for Ciné Gael Montréal's annual showcase of Irish short films. Always brilliantly curated by our own specialists of this genre of films, the public is

never left thirsty for opinionated discussion afterward.

One film has yet to be confirmed. However, the closing film on May 3 promises to be a hit, with thought-provoking, Michael Inside, the feature film that night. At its simplest, this award-winning film is about an eighteen-year-old son of a convict who is sentenced to three months in prison for drug possession but the director, Frank Berry, turns that simple recipe into a riveting drama and a gut-wrenching study of long-term incarceration.

Dafhyd Flynn shines with radiant intensity in the title role of Michael McCrea and our audience members will be spoiled with second performances this season by Hazel Doupe and Moe Dunford in supporting roles.

All films are screened at the J. A. DeSève Theater, Concordia University, 1400 de Maisonneuve West, and start at 19:15.

The price of admission for each film is \$12, with the exception of the closing

film and reception, where the cost is \$25.

MONTREAL IRISH MONUMENT PARK UPDATE

As most regular readers of "Nuacht" are aware, an effort to build a beautiful memorial park around the "Black Rock", on the Montreal side of the Victoria Bridge has been ongoing for almost a decade. The objective has been to remember the 6,000+ Irish immigrants who died and were buried in the area as result of the Great Irish Hunger in 1847, as well as to honor all the many Montrealers that went to the site of the fever sheds to provide care and comfort. Many of these caregivers contracted typhus during their great humanitarian effort and died as a result.


After many meetings and hours of discussion with our Hydro Quebec and City of Montreal partners, the five member Montreal Irish Committee decided that there was enough information on the progress of the project to update the general Montreal Irish Community and any others who might be interested. So, a meeting was held at St. Gabriel's Church Hall, on Center Street, in the Point, on January 17th 2019.

The general overview related to the different possible configurations for relocating Bridge Street that currently runs on both sides of the Black Rock. The result in all of the options presented was that after more than 50 years, visitors would be able to stand directly in front of the Black Rock and easily read the inscription and touch it etc. (Currently, to actually reach the Black Rock, people have to cross fast moving lanes of traffic which is both inconvenient and dangerous). It appeared that of the four possible configurations, the preferred choice would be to move Bridge Street north through the existing parking lot that would separate the new Hydro Station from the Memorial Park space.

This possible relocating of Bridge Street still requires a greater feasibility study of traffic patterns and the like by the City of Montreal and hopefully, the cost of this study will be approved by the City of Montreal council in the near future.

The majority of individuals who attended the meeting on January 17th appeared to be very pleased with the progress to date.

As sometimes happens with public meetings, we were



also pleased to learn, after the fact, that the audience included a member of the Grey Nuns. During our meeting introduction, we had mentioned how the Grey Nuns had led the charge to provide comfort to these sick and dying Irish, and were very pleased to later receive the following email from Sr. Elaine Baete sgm (General Council of the Grey Nuns of Montreal).

"I just want to say that I really appreciated and was moved by your presentation and your comments of the Grey Nuns caring for the typhus victims and the information shared about Mother McMullen... all of what you said really moved me. Thank you so much and prayerful blessings on all of your endeavors."

Many more months of meetings, cost studies, and other efforts remain to be completed until any final decision or plans are finalized - but we were pleased to report at the update meeting that there has been steady, very positive progress and we have a high level of confidence that the Montreal Irish Memorial Park will become a reality in the coming years.

SIMON MCDONAUGH HUMANITARIAN AWARD



Robin Robert is a longtime community volunteer, beginning as a sixteen-year-old youth baseball coach within the Leo's Boys organization. Born in 1954 to Opal Taylor and Leo Robert Jr. and the third of seven children, he has been married to Debby Quinsey for forty-one years.

Together they have raised their two sons and their pride and joy, Jeffrey and Jamie (Kaylah Dupuis).

St. Gabriel's Church in Point St. Charles is very close to Robin's heart. In the early 1990's he was elected as a Church Warden which lasted for twelve years, when moving out of the neighbourhood prevented him from continuing in this role. Always willing to work for St. Gabriel's, Robin continues as its Treasurer. One week per month is spent working at the Church, providing food from their food bank to people in need, where upwards of one hundred and fifty families pick up food to help make it to the end of the month. Additionally, Robin volunteers his time toward St. Gabriel's enormous Christmas Basket project, where more than three hundred families

receive a very generous supply of food and toys. Before summer begins, he helps organize the Gary Clahane Golf Tournament for the Church. He started a youth group at St. Gabriel's, where the kids played ball hockey in the Church Hall. Robin volunteered as a hockey coach in the Point, Verdun, Greenfield Park and Lasalle, also coaching baseball in the Point, St. Henri, and Verdun along the way.

Robin helps build the Parish's St. Patrick's Parade float with a dozen other dedicated and talented volunteers, a project that takes roughly two months to complete and which helps the Parish win a Parade trophy most years.

Robin is a key member of the Erin Sports Association, filling the role of Treasurer and helping to raise money throughout the year to benefit youth sports associations, scholarships, St. Gabriel's Church, other grassroots organizations in need of funding, and disadvantaged families at Christmas time.

Robin is known to say "Volunteering is not work when you have great people helping you." He has surrounded himself with great people as he gives back to his community. The United Irish Societies of Montreal is pleased to present Robin Robert with the 2019 Simon McDonaugh Humanitarian Award.

LIAM DALY HERITAGE AWARD

Carol McCormick began her involvement in the Irish community at five years old, singing at St. Patrick's concerts in various parishes, such as St. Thomas Aquinas, St. Gabriel, St. Kevin. She also played the lead in the Irish play: Peg 'O My Heart at St. Patrick's Basilica. She sang many times on Liam Daly's Irish Weekly and was co-host with Kevin Sullivan on the first broadcast of the Montreal St. Patrick's Day Parade on Cable TV.

Carol produced an Irish CD: "My Celtic Spirit" which sold over 1,500 copies. The sales were used to help parishes and charitable organizations. She was invited to sing at St. Patrick's Basilica, Ottawa to perform a one-woman show and to stay and be the soloist at their St. Patrick's Day Green Mass. She also cherishes the great experience of having sung, several times, the Canadian and American National Anthems at none other than the Montreal Forum and the Bell Center for the NHL Canadians Hockey Games. She smiles when she tells that at all those occasions the Canadians won!

In 2009, she chaired the St. Patrick's Society Christmas concert. For the following 3 years, she continued to chair the concert as well as serve as a Director on the Board of St. Patrick's Society of Montreal. During those three years, she also chaired the first Saint Patrick's Society Fall Family Fashion Show and the pilot project of Flowers from SPS.

In 2013, she remained with St. Patrick's Society in the new position of Secretary on the Executive Board. In 2011, she chaired the Saint Patrick's Society Luncheon and continues to do. She also continues to serve on the Executive as a VP.

THE SCHOOL OF IRISH STUDIES TO HOST MAJOR IRISH STUDIES CONFERENCE

As part of the year-long series of events marking the Tenth appiversary of the creation of the School of Irish Studies, the annual conference of the Canadian Association for Irish Studies(CAIS) will be held at Concordia this year, organized by Professor Jane McGaughey, Associate Professor of Irish Studies. She is also President of CAIS. The conference will welcome about a hundred delegates from Canada and around the world, and will schedule academic lectures and panel discussions on a wide range of topics, as well as keynote lectures by Professor Joanna Burke (Birbeck, University of London) and Professor Rhona Richman Kenneally (Concordia University). Other events will include: the premiere of a major film on the tragic story of an Irish immigrant ship to Quebec (see article below); a reading and Master Class in creative writing by the high-profile Irish writer, Kevin Barry; the launch of the most recent edition of Winter Papers, the exciting Irish cultural journal edited by Kevin Barry and Olivia Smith; the launch of a special issue of the Canadian Journal of Irish Studies on the contemporary Irish Short Story edited by Michael Kenneally; and, in conjunction with Montreal Jewish Public Library a special exhibition, Representations of the Jews in Irish Literature, with an opening lecture titled "Hyphenated Identity: Irish-Jewish Autobiographies," by Professor Pól Ó Dochartaigh, National University of Ireland Galway. PREMIERE OF TRILINGUAL DOCUMENTARY

lost chiloren of the Carricks: Irish famine memory in Rural Québec

The first trilingual documentary film on the Great Irish Famine, Lost Children of the Carricks: Irish Famine Memory in Rural Québec will be premiered at Concordia University during the Canadian Association for Irish Studies conference on May 29. Produced and directed by Professor Gearóid Ó hAllmhuráin, holder of the Johnson Chair in Quebec and Canadian Irish Studies, the film explores the Great Famine from the perspective of multiple linguistic and cultural traditions. It showcases the extraordinary oral memory of Irish-Quebecois historian, Georges Kavanagh, whose ancestors survived the wreck of the coffin ship Carricks off the edge the Gaspé peninsula in May 1847. Paradoxically, Kavanagh's francophone record has never registered on the radars of official famine history; yet, his deep understanding of the tragedy unveils a francophone Irish gemeinschaft that preserved its own exclusive memory of Ireland's Great Hunger. Filmed in the Gaspé and in Sligo, Ireland, this documentary allows Kavanagh to finally tell his story, as it follows him to the landmarks and seamarks of the Carricks tragedy and on his journey to find his ancestral village in the Gaelic-speaking northwest of Ireland.




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
