


# Me Peter O'Orien SPS Community Award 2020

Since 1993, St. Patrick's Society of Montreal has selected a Community Award recipient. Two distinct goals underpin the decision of the selection committee:

1. To honour a person within the Irish community who has served in low-profile positions yet who has worked wholeheartedly for the good of the whole community.



unanimously selected Me Peter O'Brien as the 2020 recipient of our Society's Community Award. You will have ample opportunity to meet Mr. O'Brien on March 17th at the annual Luncheon.

Mr. O'Brien has extensive experience and a most impressive resume to support our selection. Of Irish descent, this

successful lawyer has been and continues to be a pillar, leader and mentor in the Montreal community. Since the late 1980s, he has held various volunteer governance positions within and beyond the Irish community, in education, health care, animal welfare, faith-related and

other not-for-profit endeavours.

2. To honour a Montrealer of Irish descent who has assumed a broader mandate to serve beyond the borders of our local Irish societies. His/her achievements bring honour to us all and it is fitting that we acknowledge such commitment.

Over the last twenty-five years, many worthy people have received community recognition for their work in the community. You can find the full list on our website.

This year, the Community Award Selection Committee met on January 28th to review and discuss the candidacies of five worthy nominees. After some great discussion, the committee What is most pertinent, in my opinion, but certainly not the only factor, is Mr. O'Brien's involvement with the Canadian Irish Studies Foundation. In 1996, Peter O'Brien assumed the position of founding Chair of the Canadian Irish Studies Foundation, which was created under his volunteer leadership, to raise awareness of and fundraise towards a program of Canadian-

#### A WORD FROM THE PRESIDENT, CHRISTIE BROWN, FEB. 2020

Dear Community Members,

I would like to begin this first edition of Nuacht in 2020 by congratulating our Board Members who were elected into office in December at our Annual General Meeting. A warm welcome to new Board Members: Kevin Callahan and Jim Kearney who have rounded out our Board of 25 members. My thanks to all who attended the evening, and especially to the Administrative Assistant, Robin Brodrick, who helped prepare and organize the event. I sincerely thank all Board members for their continuous volunteerism to our Society (and many other organizations) throughout the year.

I invite you to read about an important meeting that took place between the Mayor of Montreal, Mme. Valérie Plante, and some members of the Irish Community on page 19 of this edition. At the invitation of the Mayor, we were asked to attend this meeting in order to discuss issues of importance to the Irish community. That said, the meeting left me with hope of continued collaboration and that our voices were heard, though knowing full well that nothing was promised. May I suggest that there are a number of upcoming events in the weeks ahead where we could all use some good news?

We are already a few weeks into the start of the Irish season, and we are all looking forward to many more wonderful events to celebrate our heritage between now and April. This year, we will celebrate despite some very recent news that has made us all in the community, quite sad.

On February 14th, we learned of the passing of Mr. Andrew Fogarty, at the age of 100. He was larger than life in the Montreal Irish Community for the past several decades. Mr. Fogarty, or Andy as he was known by all, was one of those people who you couldn't imagine the world without. Indeed, a year ago, I thought that he could live forever. When I took over as President, Andy gave me such wonderful advice, which I have used many times in the last 14 months. I am so appreciative to him for his advice, and all that he did as for St. Patrick's Society over numerous years. In particular, during his Presidency (1983 to 1985), Andrew brought about a fundamental

change to St. Patrick's by allowing women to join the Society in 1984. It is still hard for me to process that up until that time, women were not accepted as members. Andrew understood that St. Patrick's had to change, and for his vision, I am extremely thankful. It took another 14 years before Lynn Lonergan Doyle was to become the first female President of our Society, followed by Mary McDaid as the second female President in 2006. I am but the third female President in our history. Thank you Andy for so many things, but especially for being kind and generous with your delightful spirit. You will be dearly missed and I'm sure we all have an "Andy story" to share during the season. My deepest condolences to his family, of whom he was so proud. A few years ago, after learning I was an administrator at Macdonald High School, Andrew told me in great detail of the academic records his grandchildren achieved while students there. We will surely raise a glass in his honour many times in the coming weeks. May he Rest In Peace. Details of his funeral are available further in this edition of Nuacht.

I have had the pleasure of attending several events in the last few weeks, many of which feature in this edition. There is nothing like being invited to a "2 months to St. Patrick's Day Ceiligh" to get oneself back into the green season mindset! #### Dear Members:

#### TERESA DELLAR HONOURED

Every year, the West Island Palliative Care Residence holds a big fundraising Gala for Valentine's Day. It is their flagship event in their annual quest to raise the necessary funds to deliver dignified and exceptional care to the patients and their families.

This year's edition was charged with emotions because the absence of the Residence's co-founder and guardian angel, Teresa Dellar, was keenly felt. Teresa died last August after a long and painful struggle with cancer. She was only 58 years old. Her vision and tireless energy inspire all of the people connected with the Residence.

A magnificent video was shown recapping Teresa's life, achievements and contribution to palliative care. Then followed a most solemn moment, when the co-founder of the Residence, Russell Williams, announced that a name change would take place, and the Residence will be now known as "The Teresa Dellar Dalliative Care Residence". This news was warmly received by the 500 people in the room. Teresa's husband, Gavin Fernandes, accompanied by his sons Nicholas and Jonathan, then addressed the crowd, thanking everyone for their support and their commitment to keep Teresa's dream alive. Teresa's mother, brothers and sisters were in attendance and they joined in the enthusiasm knowing that Teresa's name and contributions will be permanently recognized.

Living proof of the quality of the care given was then provided by Lynne McVey, the head of the local CIUSSS (health board). Lynne gave a moving tribute to the Residence and its staff and volunteers who cared for her father, Vaughan, in his final days. He passed away just days after Teresa and Lynne was touched by the compassionate care given at the Residence while the staff coped with its own grief following the loss of Teresa.

The evening ended on two high notes. The new Executive Director, Dale Weil, made her first speech since taking over in early January. She shared her experiences as a business leader and as a member of a family deeply touched by the Residence. A few years ago, her younger brother Drew died there and she will build on these experiences as she leads the Residence forward.

Finally, the Foundation Board Chair Rob Havill announced that the event was a great success, raising a record net profit of \$640,000 to help carry on the precious work that Teresa Dellar started.

Cappabue National School in West Cork released their song One Small Change on Jan. 30, 2020, and already the video has over 85,000 views on YouTube. # **IRELAND PLANS IN PLACE FOR COVID-19**

As of the 23rd of February 2020, 78,950 cases of COVID-19 have been detected in 29 countries including China (77,041), Thailand (35), Japan (132), Singapore (89), Republic of Korea (602), Germany (16), France (12), Italy (144), the U.K. (9), the U.S.A. (35), Canada (9), Spain (2) and Australia (22). Although some 78 people have been tested for the virus in Ireland, there are no confirmed cases there and the risk is believed to be low. The


Government of Ireland website says that "Ireland has comprehensive Public Health and Emergency Plans in place for responding to public health issues including those related to new infectious agents such as Covid-19 (Coronavirus)." The HSE High Consequences Infectious Diseases Planning and Coordination Group (HCID) has been meeting three times every week since January and will adjust this schedule as appropriate.

According to the World Health Organisation (WHO), COVID-19 has been fatal in two per cent (2%) of reported cases, with the elderly and the ill the most vulnerable. That figure is "about 20 times higher than seasonal influenza," according to Dr Cillian de Gascun, Director

While the WHO is now concerned by the detection of infections that are not clearly linked to China, it has not recommended any travel or trade restrictions as of yet. The Irish Department of Foreign Affairs' Security Status rating for China, however, is currently "Avoid All Non-essential Travel, and not to travel to the Province of Hubei".

To prevent infection spreading, the WHO recommendations include regular hand washing, covering mouth and nose when coughing and sneezing as well as thoroughly cooking meat and eggs.

Irish Studies at Concordia University. During his time as Chair, from 1996 to 2001, over \$3,000,000 was raised, principally endowment funds to support what is now the School of Irish Studies at Concordia. At the conclusion of his term, the University created a "Peter O'Brien Visiting Scholar" program in Canadian-Irish studies in his honour.



# CINÉ GAEL MONTRÉAL 28<sup>TH</sup> SEASON HAS BEGUN!

One of Montreal's best little secrets has suddenly been thrust into the limelight. Ciné Gael Montreal began its twenty-eighth season on January 24 with an extraordinary kickoff: a collaboration with Concordia's School of Irish Studies and a superlative promotional effort resulted in a sold-out performance in the larger D.B. Clarke Theater at Concordia University. The reason for the opening night sell-out was the premiere of the film, LOST CHILDREN OF THE CARRICKS.

Similar to last season's opening film, Black '47, we were proud to once again present a film on the topic of the infamous Irish Famine. In all, there were approximately 300,000 Irish refugees that landed on the shores of Canada between 1845 and 1852. Several thousand lost their lives either in transit or in quarantine upon arrival due to a typhus epidemic and dysentery. The film, Lost Children of the Carricks, is a powerful documentary that put a human face on the immense tragedy. This film is about one of those "coffin ships" that sailed the 3,000 miles across the Atlantic Ocean carrying the dreams of a new life for 173 passengers. All but 48 perished as the vessel struck a reef off the frozen Gaspé peninsula and sank. For some of the descendants of those 48 survivors, this film was a sort of homecoming.



We were both honoured and delighted that the director of the film, Dr.

Gearóid Ó hAllmhuráin, was present and spoke before the film was shown. Dr. Ó hAllmhuráin, Johnson Chair of Canadian Irish Studies at Concordia University's School of Irish Studies, described in poignant terms what an achievement it was to bring this story to a wide audience and the impact on those descendants directly affected.



The film series was to continue two weeks later on February 7 with a presentation of ROSIE, a jarring dramatization of a family suddenly made homeless through no fault of their own. However, due to a snow storm, we postponed the showing. We're delighted to announce the new date of Wednesday, April 22.


The film's direction successfully conveys the panic situation of parents searching for a new place to call home whilst attempting to normalize the routine of school attendance for their four young children and shield them from the painful impact. The mother played by Sarah Greene, puts in a performance that is a force of nature and drives home the fear inherent in this situation. Peter Bradshaw wrote in The Guardian, "The potency of the film lies in showing us that the "homeless" are not a caste or tribe whose condition has

been ordained at birth, and their situation is not a cosmic punishment for laziness – they are people like everyone else whose situation has been created by economic forces.

After another two week pause, Ciné Gael Montreal returned to present its third film of the season, SOONER OR LATER on February 21. This heartwarming,

emotional tale of an elderly couple who conspire to free themselves of the nursing home and end their lives in unison is woven together with darkly comedic moments. The man's daughter whose suspicions of his lady-friend have only increased over the course of their six-month relationship is the perfect foil in their deception of driving to Kerry for a pleasant holiday.

The no-budget film by Luke Morgan stars a real-life husband and wife, Aeneas and Anna O'Donnell playing Irish characters that audiences will fall in love with. His cane-wielding Mick Jagger look contrasts beautifully with her neurotic Kathy Bates style.

#### THE NEW GOLDEN AGE OF IRISH GENEALOGY

During the course of my genealogical career I have been fortunate to lecture on How to Find Your Irish Relatives in Canada at Trinity College, Dublin and to also lecture on How to Find Your Irish Ancestors at McGill University, Montreal along with numerous places in Canada and the United States.

In my own genealogical research I discovered that my Irish ancestors have lived in Montreal since the famine years of the 1840's until now. I am of 50% Irish ancestry with my mother's family "Flynn" originating in the city of Cork in County Cork. My great great-great grandfather Cornelius Flynn (1787-1861) served in the Royal Navy for over twenty years and was on the HMS Agamemnon during the Battle of Trafalgar. I have various other Irish ancestors from Counties Clare, Donegal, Down, Fermanagh, Monaghan, Sligo, Waterford and Wexford.

There is a common myth that one can't do Irish family history research because of the destruction of the Irish Record Office on June 30, 1922 in the fighting between the pro-Treaty and anti-Treaty forces during the Civil War. Yes, there were important records destroyed like the early 19th Census Records, numerous wills and other documents but to give just one example, the Catholic parish registers were not stored in the Record Office.

With modern computer technology and the advances in digitization of archival and church records there is a "New Golden Age of Irish Genealogy". The Irish governmental authorities have been in the forefront of this movement and promoting the growth of Genealogical Tourism. If you can discover that your ancestors were from the town of Sligo in the County of Sligo then there is a good chance that your family may want to visit Sligo, stay in the local hotels, buy souvenirs, eat, drink and be merry along with the enjoyment of the beauty of the Irish countryside and the friendliness of

the Irish people.

The Irish government has been putting for free on the website www.Irishgenealogy,ie the Indexes to Civil Registration of Births, Marriages, and Deaths and the actual certificates themselves. As of January 20, 2020 here are the years covered:

- Births: 1864-1919 Indexes and Certificates
- Marriages: 1845-1944 Indexes and Certificates (Catholic Marriages begin 1864)
- Deaths: 1864-1969 Indexes 1878-1969 Certificates 1864-1877 coming this year

On the National Archives of Ireland website (www.nationalarchives.ie), Census 1901 and 1911 are available. Various will indexes and a host of other databases are all free.

The Public Record Office of Northern Ireland on their website www.nidirect.gov.uk/proni also has various databases, all free.

The Catholic parish registers are held at the National Library in Dublin and are available online at subscription websites like Ancestry and Findmypast.

When doing Irish genealogical research you use a combination of free and subscription websites. The research is not as simple as putting in an Irish surname as you see in the television commercials.

Land records are used a lot in Irish genealogical research. I did some research years ago for the late Omer Lavallee who was the Archivist for Canadian Pacific Railways. His mother was a Shaughnessy from County Clare. Using the Sir Richard Griffith's Primary Valuation of Land we were able to get to the exact location of his family's small landholding there.

The Quebec Family History Society is a

federally registered non-profit charitable organization. In its Heritage Centre in Sainte Anne de Bellevue, members have access to over 20 billion records for all over the world, including the church records for Quebec, with the St.Patrick's parish registers beginning in 1859. There are millions of records for Irish research and most of the major subscription databases are available free at the library for members.

DNA is the newest genealogical tool that budding genealogists are using. I would recommend Ancestry's Autosomal Test for beginners. Yes, you will get your ethnic percentages but more important are your actual DNA matches. A gentleman in Buffalo has DNA matches with my Gormans in the 19<sup>th</sup> century in Ireland but he does not know where in Ireland his Gormans were living. I will be able to tell him where his family was living in the mid-19<sup>th</sup> century in or near the parish of Ballyphilip in County Down.



#### CENTENARIAN PASSES ON ST. VALENTINE'S DAY

On Friday February 14, St. Patrick's Society lost its most senior past president when Andrew Fogarty left this earth to be with his beloved Mary, who he missed every single day since September 10, 2011. He carried a photo of Mary with him wherever he went. So, it is not lost on me how appropriate it is that he rejoined his love on Valentine's Day.

On May 1, 2019 Andrew celebrated his 100<sup>th</sup> birthday in hospital after a recent fall, something he never truly recovered from. Such a special man, both St. Patrick's Society and the UIS had been preparing to celebrate quietly with Andrew, something that became impossible due to the circumstances. During his convalescence various people visited Andrew. A giant card was circulated, signed and delivered to Andrew. He was not going to be forgotten, that was for sure.

Andrew was active in the community for well over sixty years. He was President or Board member of nearly every organization, including a Founding Director of the English Catholic Council, Director of St. Patrick's Square, Chair of St. Mary's Ball, served on the Foundation and Centre Boards of the Lindsay Hospital and Father Dowd Home, served as Past President of St. Patrick's Society and Foster Home Recruiting Centre and also a Trustee of Montreal St. Patrick's

membership in the UIS to go along with his Lifetime membership in the Society. It is an uncommon practice for someone of Andrew's age to be named Grand Marshal. Despite that, in 2013, at the age of 92, Andrew served as Grand Marshal of the annual Parade with great pride and humility, likely the oldest ever to be so honoured. In 2016 St. Patrick's Society recognized the totality of Andrew's community involvement when he was selected as the recipient of our Community Award. To complete the Parade honour trifecta, in 2017 the Erin Sports Association selected Andrew as its Irishman of the Year. While Andrew had a less than stellar centenary year in terms of health, there wasn't a gathering in the community

#### **REM LIGHT RAIL STATION & GAA FIELDS**

On November 6<sup>th</sup>, 2019 on the first anniversary of former premier Bernard Landry's death, members of Montreal's Irish community were thrown a curveball when Mayor Valérie Plante tweeted her wish to see the new REM light rail station named "Griffintown-Bernard-Landry" to highlight Mr. Landry's important contribution to the development of the city.

Resistance in the community to Mayor Plante's proposal was immediate, swift and unrelenting. A petition was launched. People reacted passionately through social media and some reactions were vicious in response to Mayor Plante's proposal.

On December 11th Special Advisor to the Mayor, Jimmy Zoubris, invited some community leaders to a meeting called for January 15th at City Hall to discuss the issues which are important to the Irish Community. In attendance from the City were Zoubris, Councillors Craig Sauvé, Sterling Downey and Peter McQueen along with a representative from the Sud Ouest Borough and Mayor Valérie Plante. Present from among the leaders from the community were Society President Christie Brown, UIS President Patricia Mulqueen, Erin Sports Association President Tim Furlong and Montreal Irish Monument Park Foundation Directors Fergus Keyes and Victor Boyle.

The major issue discussed was the Mayor's wish to see the REM station named in honour of the late former premier. The Mayor heard unanimously from around the table that the new REM station at the Peel Basin should wholly reflect the important history of the Irish community. Participants reminded Mayor Plante that Griffintown was built by the Irish community, and that a shared, hyphenated name, would not be suitable. Community leaders around the table listened as Mayor Plante supported her wish. Frank and direct discussion ensued. Another issue of importance, raised by Honourary Consul General Dr. Michael Kenneally, was the lack of available fields for the GAA to properly conduct its summertime activities. The councillors and representative from the Sud Ouest were all aware of this ongoing and unresolved issue.

Though those present were optimistic that the Mayor would consider our arguments in this debate, she did not commit to a retraction of her desire to name the station in honour of Mr. Landry.

At the conclusion of the meeting there was a willingness to continue the dialogue between the Administration and community leaders.

Time will tell if our voices were truly heard.

# ST. PATRICK'S PARADE ORGANIZERS ADAPT

The 197<sup>th</sup> consecutive St. Patrick's Parade in Montreal takes place on Sunday March 22<sup>nd</sup>. The organizers have been met with yet another challenge. The partial closure of boul. René-Lévesque has forced the United Irish Societies of Montreal to use boul. de Maisonneuve as its staging area. Between moving the parade onto de Maisonneuve, moving back to Ste-Catherine Street to a shortened route, Parade Director Patty McCann and her team are used to adapting to the challenges. The Parade will still run eastward on Ste. Catherine Street, however in the next little while the organizers will be sending instructions to parade participants advising where to show up and when.

This year's Grand Marshal is familiar to the Society. Member SHAWN O'DONNELL, Head of School of The Sacred Heart School of Montreal, was selected by the United Irish Societies in October. He leads a team of over 40 faculty, staff and administrators for a 235 student school. He received his undergraduate degree at the University of New Brunswick and his MBA from Concordia's John Molson School of Business. Prior to his current position, he was Director, Senior School, at Selwyn House High School for boys and Principal of École Bilingue Notre Dame de Sion.

Filling the role of Chief Reviewing Officer is STEVE GARNETT, a community minded volunteer who gives back to the city through the Montreal Auxiliary Firefighters. He has been president for over fifteen years and the organization has been supporting the Montreal firefighters for over 75 years. The group responds to all major interventions with a rehab unit and first aid vehicle. They provide warm food and energy drinks to help the firefighters maintain their strength while battling the flames and provide first aid when necessary. Steve is also the director of the Montreal Firefighter's Museum and their fleet of 26 antique fire trucks.

The Erin Sports Association selected JOSEPH QUINN as its Irishman of the Year for 2020. Joseph's Irish heritage stems from numerous counties, including Wexford, Tipperary, and Kildare on his mother's side and Mayo, Tyrone, and Monaghan on his father's side. The community will gather to fête Joseph on March 14<sup>th</sup> at EVO Centreville at the annual Irishman of the Year Breakfast, organized by the Erin Sports Association.

As for the Parade, organizers will be unveiling details on March 13<sup>th</sup> at a press conference at Montreal's City Hall. Stay tuned!

# BREXIT BEGINS AS ELECTORAL EARTHQUAKE HITS IRELAND

To put it mildly, political events in both the United Kingdom and Ireland have been a momentous roller coaster ride since last autumn.

In October, British Prime Minister Boris Johnson reached an agreement with European negotiators to allow the UK to leave the European Community but was unable to get the necessary parliamentary support to pass the bill. This impasse led to a general election in December which gave Johnson's Conservative Party, running on the slogan of "Get Brexit Done!", a huge majority. The election results had special relevance for Northern Ireland, especially for the Democratic Unionist Party (DUP). From 2017 to 2019, the Tory government of Theresa May needed the DUP's ten seats in order to govern, and the DUP used this influence to push for a hard Brexit. With his comfortable majority, Johnson no longer depends on the DUP and appears ready to toss his erstwhile allies under the proverbial bus.

In 2018, Johnson told a DUP conference that he would never support a trade border between Great Britain and the Irish Sea. However, when he replaced Theresa May as Prime Minister last fall, Johnson realized that the only way he could get a guick deal was to meet European Community demands to respect the Good Friday Agreement and avoid a hard border between Northern Ireland and the Republic. Consequently, the deal he agreed to with the European Union essentially puts a trade border in the Irish Sea. The DUP is furious, but there is little it can do, given its loss of political influence in Westminster. To add insult to injury, the DUP also lost two of its parliamentary seats as voters punished the party for its hardline stand on Brexit. The loss of North Belfast to Sinn Féin's John Finucane was an especially bitter pill to swallow as that seat had been held by unionist parties since the creation of Northern Ireland in 1921.

The loss of influence in Westminster put additional pressure on the DUP to see the Northern Ireland Assembly up and running again after three years of deadlock over issues of a DUP subsidy scandal and recognition of the Irish language. After intense negotiations, the Assembly started up in January. Ironically, one of its first acts was for all parties to vote against Johnson's Brexit withdrawal deal. This unanimity, however, was based on different perspectives. Sinn Féin and the smaller parties were voting against the agreement because they want to remain in the EU while the DUP opposed it because it is seen as separating Northern Ireland from the UK. Regardless, the Assembly vote against the Brexit bill is only symbolic and has no force in law.

On January 31st, the UK formally left the European Union. While Brexit is "done" in that it has officially happened, it is just the beginning of complex negotiations to work out the relationship between the UK and the EU. There is an 11th month transition period in which Britain will adhere to EU regulations and standards. In his inimitable style, Johnson has already made several aggressive statements and unfounded assertions about the negotiations. He cited the trade deal between the EU and Australia as a possible model for the UK. However, Australia does not currently have a formal trade agreement with the European Community. More recently, he has threatened to break off trade talks with the EU if Brussels pressures the UK to follow the bloc's rules after the transition ends next year. He maintains he will seek a Canada-style free trade agreement although Treasury officials have warned it would leave the British economy 4.9% worse off by 2035. In a typically grandiose move, Johnson is also making noises about building a bridge between Scotland and Northern Ireland as a sop to Unionists. 'Bonkers' has been one of the kinder responses to this idea. Given Johnson's mercurial personality and lack of consistency, the next months and indeed years promise to be turbulent. Already he has unexpectedly sacked the competent Secretary of State for Northern Ireland Julian Smith who was credited with getting the Assembly up and running and had won respect from all the parties. Nevertheless, the critical importance of respecting the Good Friday Agreement and avoiding a hard border between Northern Ireland and the Republic remain key elements to any future resolution.

Meanwhile, the Republic of Ireland held an election on February 8<sup>th</sup>, and the results were a shock to the pundits and the establishment. Since the founding of the Irish Free State in 1922, Ireland has been a duopoly, with government alternating between Fianna Fáil and Fine Gael (although the two centre-right parties sometimes had to depend on smaller parties such as Labour). To the astonishment of all, Sinn Féin had the largest popular vote (24.5%) and won as many seats (37) as Fianna Fáil. The governing Fine Gael party was reduced to 35 seats. Despite its Republican credentials, the election was not about Irish unity or Brexit. Sinn Féin focused on breadand-butter issues such as dealing with the housing crisis, soaring rents, and the ailing health care system. Its message resonated particularly with young people who voted overwhelmingly for Sinn Féin and its message of change.



This leaves Ireland in a complex situation, and it will take some weeks to resolve itself. Sinn Féin has a mandate to try to form a government and has approached the smaller left parties to see if a coalition is feasible. Fianna Fáil at first said it would be willing to talk to Sinn Féin but has now ruled out negotiations. Fine Gael has rejected any coalition with Sinn Féin, but it is unlikely that Sinn Féin

would be interested in working with Fine Gael anyway. There is now talk of a Fine Gael/Fianna Fáil coalition to keep Sinn Féin out of government but given the clear statement that young people in Ireland want change and new priorities, such a move could prove politically risky. Whatever the outcome, politics in Ireland, in the words of W.B. Yeats, are "changed, changed utterly."

#### LOST CHILDREN OF THE CARRICKS

The documentary LOST CHILDREN OF THE CARRICKS was presented in partnership with Ciné Gael as the opening film of their 2020 season. With strong interest, support and presence from Montreal's Irish societies, the Irish Embassy in Ottawa, Irish Studies students and members of the broader community, there was a full house of over 380 people in Concordia University's D.B. Clarke Theatre

on Friday, January 24<sup>th</sup> for the Official Premiere of Lost Children of The Carricks | Defying the Great Irish Famine to create a Canadian Legacy. The documentary is written and

directed by Professor Gearóid Ó hAllmhuráin, Johnson Chair in Québec and Canadian Irish Studies, School of Irish Studies, Concordia University, narrated by Irish poet and playwright Vincent Woods (Dublin, Ireland), produced by Celtic Crossings Productions (Montréal, Québec) with Executive Producer Cecilia McDonnell.

#### THE LOST CHILDREN OF THE CARRICKS

A seventy minute documentary of exodus and reunion spanning 168 years, the film investigates:



- The mass clearances of Irish-speaking families from the Irish estates of British Foreign Secretary, Lord Palmerston at the height of the Great Famine
- The families' assisted emigration from Sligo aboard the ill-fated ship Carricks of Whitehaven and
- Their lasting legacy on Canadian shores.

A 3,000 mile voyage to the far side of the Atlantic, Lord Palmerston's tenants departed a Gaelic world in rural Sligo for a Francophone world in rural Québec, carrying their music and folklore, language and religion to an emerging Canadian nation.

One of nine coffin ships hired by Palmerston to transport 2000 of his surplus tenants to Canada, The Carricks would wreck off the frozen Gaspé coast on the Gulf of St. Lawrence in May 1847. Only 48 of the 173 passengers would reach the shore alive.

The film opens with a haunting sean nós lament and re-enacts an old tradition of leave-taking in the West of Ireland. Before departing home and clachán, emigrants brought their fire to the fire of a neighbour hoping that one day they would return home to reclaim it and, with it their place in the Old World. For Patrick Kaveney and Sarah MacDonald's family from Lord Palmerston's estate in south Sligo, those embers would flicker in waiting for 168 years.

#### THE JOURNEY

Filmed on location in the Gaspé and in Ireland, Lost Children of the Carricks traces the extraordinary journey of Patrick Kaveney, Sarah MacDonald and their six children from their clachán in Cross, near Ballymote to Québec's Gaspé peninsula, and the remarkable return of their francophone descendants to Ireland five generations and 168 years later. The film follows Québécois-Irish historian Georges Kavanagh as he walks in the footsteps of his 'grandfather's grandfather'— through the landmarks and seamarks of The Carricks tragedy and finally down the narrow country road to his ancestral village to meet a community of cousins who had assumed that their relatives had all perished in the wreck of The Carricks.

#### THE EXPERTS

This trilingual film is enriched by expert testimony from leading Irish historian Professor Gearóid Ó Tuathaigh (National University of Ireland Galway) and Sligo historian Joe McGowan (Sligo Heritage), and rare archival footage of cultural life in rural Québec during the 1930s.
