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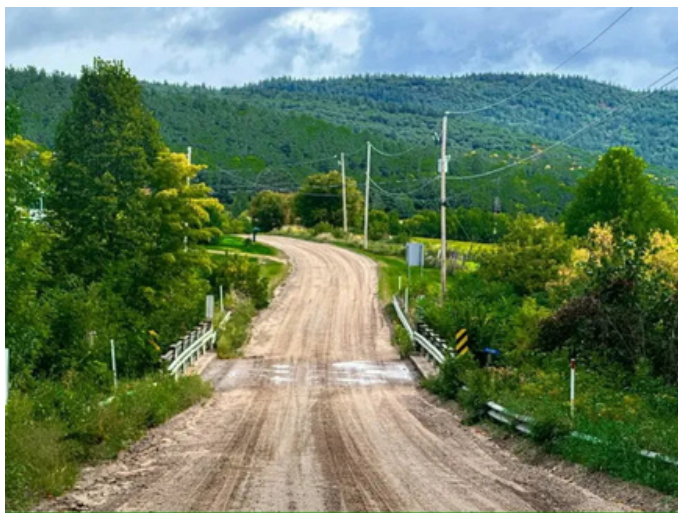
# CIMPN Launches *The Irish Mile*<sup>TM</sup>: A New Digital Journey Through Irish Heritage in Québec

The Canadian Irish Migration Preservation Network (CIMPN) is a not-for-profit association dedicated to preserving, conserving, and promoting Irish heritage and culture in Canada. Our mission is to foster a collaborative network of organizations and individuals—both nationally and internationally—who share a commitment to researching and commemorating the rich history of the Irish in Canada. By working together, we keep ancestral stories alive and celebrate the enduring contributions of Irish migrants and their descendants to Canada's social and cultural fabric.

CIMPN is now entering one of its most exciting phases yet—one defined by collaboration, digital innovation, and the strengthening of Irish heritage across Québec. At the centre of this momentum is *The Irish Mile*<sup>TM</sup>, our flagship interactive mapping project, proudly supported by the Secrétariat aux relations avec les Québécois d'expression anglaise (SRQEA). Officially launched on January 27, 2026, on the CIMPN website, *The Irish Mile*<sup>TM</sup> is a province-wide digital map and storytelling platform that brings together 127 Irish heritage sites from across Québec.

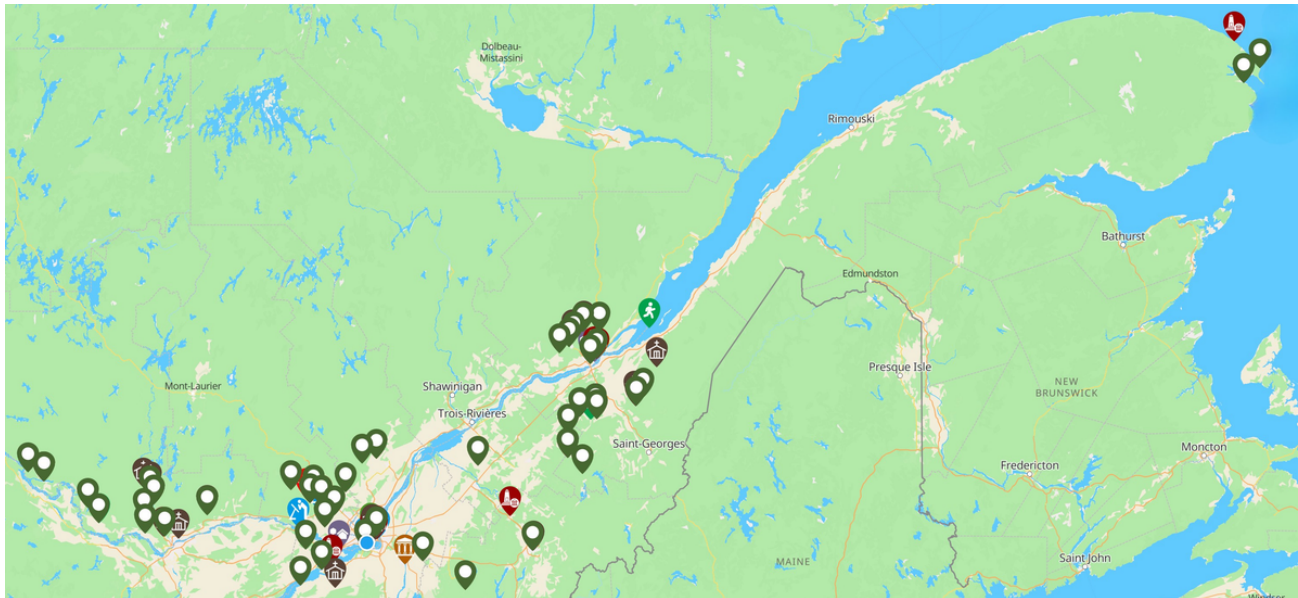
The project's name draws inspiration from the historic "Irish Mile," a unit of measurement used in Ireland before the 19th century, equivalent to approximately 1.27 modern miles. For CIMPN, *The Irish Mile*<sup>TM</sup> also symbolizes the long and often difficult journeys taken by Irish emigrants who left their homeland to build new lives in Québec's towns and communities. The project begins with 127 heritage sites—a deliberate nod to the 1.27 traditional Irish Mile—and will continue to expand as new sites and stories are added.



More than a map, *The Irish Mile*<sup>TM</sup> is an immersive digital experience. The platform allows users to explore heritage locations through photographs, videos, audio recordings, and curated historical resources, bringing Québec's Irish past to life in dynamic new ways. The launch marks only the beginning of a growing, living archive that will continue to evolve for generations.

Through this initiative and others, CIMPN is also building a bilingual digital repository documenting Irish migration to Québec and the lasting cultural influence that continues to shape communities today. As part of the SRQEA-supported project Preserving and Showcasing Irish Heritage in Québec, CIMPN is developing an extensive digital and educational platform dedicated to exploring the diverse histories of Irishness across the province. By collaborating with local communities, historians, experts, and individuals of Irish descent, we are capturing and preserving the varied legacies of Irish settlement in Québec.

We invite you to explore *The Irish Mile™* on our website and share your feedback. Community participation is essential to the continued growth of this project, and we welcome suggestions for additional sites and stories to include. CIMPN is deeply grateful to the Secrétariat aux relations avec les Québécois d'expression anglaise (SRQEA) for their generous support, which made the development of this initiative possible.

Together, we are building a living archive—one that honours the past, celebrates the present, and ensures that the stories of Irish migration and heritage in Québec continue to be shared for generations to come

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# 2026 Community Award Co-Recipients

## J. Peter Shea and Patrick Shea

The Board of Directors is pleased to announce the selection of Peter Shea (posthumously) and Patrick Shea as the recipients of the 2026 St. Patrick's Society of Montreal Community Award.

This selection recognizes not only extraordinary individual service, but also a remarkable continuity of commitment to Irish culture, history, and community life in Montreal

### J. Peter Shea (1943–2025)



For decades, Peter Shea was a central and deeply respected figure within St. Patrick's Society of Montreal. He served as President of the Society from 2000 to 2002 and, for many years, as Society Historian — a role he fulfilled with dedication, intellectual rigour, and a profound respect for our shared heritage until his passing in September 2025. He was the current longest-serving member of the Society at the time of his death.

Peter's leadership extended far beyond titles. He was a thoughtful steward of the Society's history and traditions, always encouraging careful reflection on the legacy we carry forward. Among his many significant contributions was his pivotal role in the 2012 annual general meeting debate that led to the posthumous reinstatement of Thomas D'Arcy McGee as a member of the Society — a moment of historical importance that reflected both courage and reconciliation.

He was also a key contributor to the Society's 2017-2018 commemoration marking the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the assassination of Thomas D'Arcy McGee, helping ensure that the event was remembered with dignity, historical depth, and scholarly care.

In 2001, Peter was named Irishman of the Year by the Erin Sports Association in recognition of his contributions to the Irish community. His commitment to cultural life included serving on the committee that brought the University of Notre Dame Concert Band to Montreal in 2000 — an initiative that strengthened cultural ties and enriched the community's artistic life.

Peter's community involvement went beyond the Irish community. He served on the board of governors of Concordia University, was the president of the Loyola College Alumni Association, was a founding director of the Loyola High School Alumni Association, and was a long-time member of the board of Catholic Community Services.

Peter's legacy within the Society is one of integrity, scholarship, leadership, and deep devotion to the Irish community in Montreal. His impact continues to be felt in the Society's work today.

### Patrick Shea

The President of St. Patrick's Society of Montreal from 2010 to 2012, Patrick Shea continues his father's long and distinguished tradition of leadership and service within our community. During his tenure as President, he demonstrated thoughtful stewardship, steady judgment, and a clear commitment to strengthening the Society's relevance and impact in contemporary Montreal. His leadership was marked by integrity, collaboration, and a deep respect for the Society's history and mission.

Patrick was the honorary chairperson of the Society's annual charitable ball in 2024. Patrick currently serves as Chair of the Canadian Irish Studies Foundation, the organization that supports the School of Irish Studies at Concordia University. In this role, he plays an important part in advancing education, academic research, and cultural programming that sustain and expand Irish studies in Montreal and beyond. Under his guidance, the Foundation continues to foster scholarship, support students, and promote meaningful engagement with Ireland's rich intellectual and cultural traditions.



Like his father, Patrick's community engagement is much broader than the Irish community alone. He is the chair of the board of governors of Loyola High School, a member of the boards of directors of the MUHC Foundation, the Andover Canadian Fund, and the Father Dowd Foundation, and a member of the Faculty Advancement Board of McGill Law School, and he has previously chaired or served on the boards of numerous other not-for-profit organizations. He has fundraised extensively for Loyola High School, Phillips Academy, Princeton University, McGill University, St. Mary's Hospital, the MUHC, and the CHUM.

His ongoing work reflects a sustained dedication to ensuring that Irish history, scholarship, and culture remain vibrant, accessible, and relevant to future generations. Through both community leadership and academic advocacy, Patrick exemplifies the enduring spirit of service that defines the Irish community in Montreal.

### A Shared Legacy

Recognizing Peter Shea posthumously alongside Patrick Shea honours both a lifetime of exceptional service and the continuation of that commitment through the next generation.

Together, their contributions embody the values at the heart of St. Patrick's Society of Montreal: leadership, cultural stewardship, community engagement, and an enduring dedication to the Irish presence in this city.

We look forward to celebrating their legacy at the 2026 Community Award presentation.

# CINÉ GAEL MONTREAL: IRISH STORIES. BIG SCREEN. LONG TRADITION.

For more than thirty years, Ciné Gael Montréal has played a quiet but vital role in Canadian Irish cultural life in our fair city. Founded in 1992, it is one of the longest running Irish film series in North America, sustained by community commitment, volunteer effort, and a belief that Irish stories deserve space on the big screen.

Rooted in Montreal's Irish community, and open to all, Ciné Gael presents films of Irish interest in one or both of Ireland's official languages. What defines the programme is not geography, although the Cinematography can transport the viewer, but connection: films that explore Irish culture, history, language, politics, diaspora, and lived experience, whether produced in Ireland, Montreal or elsewhere. The selection includes feature films, documentaries, and shorts that reflect Ireland in all its complexity-rural and urban, historical and contemporary, familiar and challenging. Many of these films are rarely screened in Canadian cinemas, making Ciné Gael an important access point for Irish-focused cinema that might otherwise go unseen.

This season's programme reflects the continued vitality and range of Irish-interest filmmaking. The selected films engage with contemporary Irish life and experience, exploring questions of Identity, memory, change, and belonging, themes that resonate strongly within the Irish diaspora today. Several of this season's screenings offer rare opportunities to see recent films of Irish interest on the big screen in Canada, presented in a carefully curated, communal setting that streaming platforms simply cannot replicate. Together, they form a season that is timely, thoughtful, and one that will resonate long after the credits roll.

At its core, Ciné Gael Montreal is an educational, non-profit community initiative. Screenings are supported by contextual material and opportunities for discussion, transforming each event into more than entertainment: an opportunity to learn, reflect, and engage with Ireland's past, present, and global experience.

In an era of streaming platforms, Ciné Gael Montreal remains community-driven and purpose-led. Its continued existence depends on public awareness, material support, and on audiences who understand cultural traditions only survive when people participate in them. Operating within Quebec's educational and cultural framework, Ciné Gael remains accessible, welcoming, and inclusive, attracting long-established Irish Canadians, newer arrivals, students, film enthusiasts, and the simply curious.

Screenings typically take place on Friday evenings at Concordia University's J.A. DeSève Cinema, a relaxed, central setting that encourages conversation before and after the films. Over the years, Ciné Gael has become not just a place to watch Irish cinema, but a place to gather, reconnect, and share perspectives.

# A LEGACY OF COMPASSION: THE IRISH PROTESTANT BENEVOLENT SOCIETY OF MONTREAL

Established in 1856, the Irish Protestant Benevolent Society (IPBS) of Montreal stands as a venerable pillar of the city's cultural and philanthropic landscape. For 170 years, this organization has remained dedicated to its founding mission of supporting those of Irish Protestant descent while evolving into a significant benefactor for the broader community.

Operating with a unique financial model, the IPBS raises no funds from the general public. Instead, every charitable undertaking and legacy project is funded entirely through the strategic management of its internal investment portfolio. This independence allows the Society to maintain a steady, quiet impact on Montreal life, guided by a Council of dedicated volunteers who manage all administrative duties without paid staff.

The Society's commitment to charity is deeply personal, characterized by direct payments to needy applicants that are preceded by personal visits from Council members to ensure a human connection.

Beyond individual aid, the IPBS has increasingly focused on substantial "Legacy Projects" that preserve Irish heritage and support vital civic institutions. Recent years have seen the Society sponsor the Old Brewery Mission's annual dinner in May and provide significant backing to the Black Rock Memorial Foundation and the School of Irish Studies at Concordia University.

Breaking new ground in 2026, the IPBS extended its reach beyond the Montreal area for the first time in its 170-year history by awarding a bursary and scholarship donation to the Irish Regiment (Sudbury) Association. This milestone illustrates a creative expansion of the Society's philanthropic footprint.

Heritage and history are woven into the fabric of the IPBS, as evidenced by its annual newsletter distributed to its members each October or November. This publication serves as a historical record, featuring detailed profiles of noted Irish figures such as industrialist William Clendinneng, Matthew Hamilton Gault, and the statesman Thomas D'Arcy McGee.

# A LEGACY OF COMPASSION: THE IRISH PROTESTANT BENEVOLENT SOCIETY OF MONTREAL (CON'T)

This focus on leadership reflects the Society's own lineage of past presidents—men and women who shaped the Montreal business and civil landscape. The Society maintains a physical and spiritual link to this past through its connection to Mount Royal Cemetery, where the IPBS maintains a dedicated lot and honors the many influential members buried throughout the grounds.

The modern IPBS remains a highly active participant in Montreal's vibrant Irish culture. The Society maintains a strong presence at local lectures, the "Walk to the Stone," and commemorations for the Great Hunger. Its historical relationship with the St. Patrick's Society remains a cornerstone of its community ties, exemplified by the IPBS sponsoring the 2025 St. Patrick's Day Parade with a \$5,000 contribution.

To maintain this momentum, the Council recently added three new members to diversify its skill set and ensure the organization remains creative and relevant. Current operations are a blend of tradition and modernity, with monthly meetings held via internet calls on the last Tuesday of the month, while the prestigious Forget House on Sherbrooke Street serves as the venue for the Annual General Meeting and reception.

Looking toward the future, the IPBS is constantly seeking new members who wish to contribute to this storied legacy. The Society continues to foster links with heritage networks across Quebec and utilizes its website at [Irishpbs.com](http://Irishpbs.com) to provide current resources and contact information for those interested in its mission. Inspired by the history chronicled in Edgar Andrew Collard's book "The Irish Way," the Society remains a steadfast guardian of Irish Protestant identity in Montreal, blending business acumen with a profound sense of duty to the community.
